

Dear Colleagues ...

It is our pleasure to invite you to join us for the Ninth Annual Meeting of the International Association of Medical Science Educators (IAMSE), to be held in Los Angeles, California from July 16-19, 2005. This event, hosted by the University of Southern California Keck School of Medicine, will explore issues in the teaching and learning of sciences fundamental to practice in all health professions. The meeting is directed toward course and clerkship directors, basic scientists, academic physicians, preceptors, deans for medical education, academic affairs, faculty development, CME, educational psychologists, and all those who have interest in more appropriately integrating science within health professions curricula. As global interdisciplinary events, IAMSE annual association meetings attract participants on average from thirty countries, who represent subject disciplines throughout all human health professions and veterinary medicine.

The program for IAMSE 2005 addresses today's current issues and trends that influence science teaching and learning within the curriculum. Three significant examples are "How We Learn," "Effective Organizational Change" and "Students' Voice in Education." As in previous IAMSE annual association meetings, internationally recognized speakers will set the stage with topics for numerous interactive small group focus sessions and hands-on workshops. Poster sessions and oral presentations of original work have been expanded. On Saturday, day-long courses in faculty development will be provided in five concurrent offerings and the registration limit set at thirty individuals per course. The Monday plenary session promises a lively, provocative debate that examines "30 Years of PBL." A special Tuesday morning plenary session provides an update on "USMLE – What Should Preclinical Educators Know?"

New features in the program for IAMSE 2005 include: 1) faculty development courses that may be applied towards the **Medical Education Research Certificate (MERC)** offered by the Research in Medical Education (RIME) section of the AAMC Group on Educational Affairs; 2) "Innovations in Technology Supported Learning" which allows exhibitors and faculty to join forces to provide hands-on, up-to-date information on a variety of topics; and 3) the first series of **Resource Xchange** sessions that invite participants to share material on a range of medical education topics.

Venues for IAMSE 2005 will be the Keck School of Medicine, USC, and the Omni Los Angeles Hotel at California Plaza. USC's School of Medicine, founded in 1885, was the first medical school established in the region. In 1999, in recognition of extraordinary philanthropic support from the W.M. Keck Foundation, the Keck School of Medicine received its present name. The four-diamond Omni Hotel, where meeting registrants will stay, is located on historic Bunker Hill in the very center of downtown Los Angeles. (Register before June 15 to receive the reduced IAMSE group rate!)

The IAMSE gala social event this year will provide registrants and their guests the unique opportunity to experience the Autry National Center's Museum of the American West, located in Los Angeles' scenic Griffith Park. Gene Autry, known as "America's Favorite Singing Cowboy," is the only entertainer to have five stars on Hollywood's Walk of Fame. The Autry National Center explores the experiences and perceptions of the diverse peoples of the American West.

Participants who register before April 1, 2005 will qualify for reduced registration rates. The deadline for Poster Abstract Submission is March 15. We cordially invite you to join us this coming July for a professional development experience in the true style of the International Association of Medical Science Educators.

Meeting Description

This meeting will provide a forum for medical faculty to gain a better understanding of how the fundamental sciences may be more effectively presented so that they are relevant and appropriate to the needs of those in medical training.

Intended Audience

This meeting is designed for all those who have responsibility for teaching the fundamental sciences of medicine, which we define as the subjects arising from the traditional disciplines of basic science, including but not limited to Anatomy & Neuroscience, Behavioral Science, Biochemistry, Microbiology & Immunology, Molecular & Cell Biology, Pathology, Pharmacology and Physiology. The IAMSE Board of Directors welcomes and invites all educators and members of the medical community, including allopathic, osteopathic, podiatric and chiropractic medical schools, as well as those from dental and veterinary colleges and especially colleagues from the clinical disciplines of medicine.

Meeting Host

Located in Los Angeles, the Keck School of Medicine of the University of Southern California trains tomorrow's leaders in patient care and biomedical research and provides advanced health care to the people of Southern California. Increasingly, the Keck School is expanding its biomedical research enterprise and, in so doing, raising its profile as a premier medical school.

Building on Excellence

Keck School leaders have embarked upon a remarkable transformation, reinventing the school for the new millennium. Already, leaders and faculty have seen major growth in school research dollars, philanthropic funds and patient care revenue. Planning and construction on three new research facilities has begun, as has the recruitment of scores of new faculty members, culled from the country's elite scientists and physicians.

At present, the Keck School of Medicine ranks among the nation's top 25 medical schools in federally sponsored research (Association of American Medical Colleges, 1999). Keck School departments have risen to national prominence, with ophthalmology, pediatrics and preventive medicine consistently ranked among the top ten in the country. Keck School physicians are known as experts in advanced medical care and research. More than 175 Keck School faculty members are listed among the "Best Doctors in America" (Woodward/White, Inc. 2004) and 84 are listed in "America's Top Doctors" (Castle Connolly Guide, 2004).

In education, faculty members have modernized the curriculum, providing students with a more relevant education in the face of an explosion of biomedical knowledge and rapid changes in the health care system.

Research programs in genetics, cancer, neurogenetics, transplantation medicine, and other key areas—have attracted national recognition. The school's dual commitments to collaborative interdisciplinary research and rapidly translating scientific findings from the lab bench to the patient's bedside have proved pivotal in its continuing success in research.

- identify effective use of course resources, e.g., faculty, texts, syllabi, lab support, student evaluations
- · evaluate productive interactions between fellow course directors and deans of education
- analyze productive interactions between course directors and students

C-2 Writing Effective Multiple Choice Questions

The purpose of this course is to help faculty improve the quality of multiple choice examination questions. Through practical exercises and informative presentations, faculty will learn how to effectively create, evaluate, and utilize multiple choice questions for their particular discipline.

Participants will:

- Explore issues relating to the construction of quality multiple choice exam questions including how to recognize and avoid technical flaws
- Discuss methods to create and use clinical vignettes for testing of basic science content
- Practice writing and critiquing questions in a small group format
- Examine approaches to question evaluation using performance-based statistical indices

C-3 Qualitative/Quantitative Research Methods in Medical Education

The purpose of this course is to help medical science educators to use qualitative and quantitative methods appropriately and effectively in educational planning, evaluation and research.

- Describe the appropriate uses of common qualitative and quantitative methods in educational planning, evaluation and research
- Analyze qualitative data, such as the results of open-ended questions in surveys, interviews, focus groups, and observational field notes
- Design effective structured survey questions

This workshop focuses on developing a learner-centered environment in the medical school classroom. It is designed to help faculty recognize key elements for making the transition to a learner-centered environment in their classrooms and to examine strategies for becoming a reflective practitioner who's job is to help the learner to learn.

- Fostering a safe learning environment in which students engage in meaningful learning
- Setting and meeting classroom goals
- Assessing progress in this environment

All accepted and qualifying abstracts will be published on the IAMSE website in June of 2005.

Guidelines for Submission:

- Completed registration is required for publication of abstracts
- · A maximum of two abstracts will be accepted by any one Presenting Author
- All abstracts must be typed in English using the format located at www.iamse.org/abstract_upload.htm
- Abstract, including title and author(s), must fit inside a box no larger than 17cm wide by 11.5cm tall. Use these borders as a template.
- Type the title in bold, uppercase letters. Do not use abbreviations in the title.
- Using Italics, list the name(s) of the author (place an asterisk next to the presenting author) and the institution, city and state, and country where the work was done. See the example below.
- Electronic submission of abstracts is preferred. If sent by e-mail attachment, please use Microsoft Word


