Editorial Timeline




3 Tips for Making the Most of Feedback

- "The reviewer is always right."
 - Read all reviews carefully. Take some time off, then read them again.
 - Analyze reviews for points of convergence, divergence. Collectively, what do they say about your paper?
 - Examine how the editor prioritizes reviewer comments in his/her decision letter.
 - Discuss these ideas with colleagues or other interested parties.
- "Major Revisions" means major revisions.
 - Additional, meaningful background work
 - Re-analysis, potentially new implications
 - Reorganization of ideas and, by extension, writing
- Keep the goal in mind.
 - Participating in a community dialogue about what interests you
 - Contributing to community understanding and capacity





- Feature Articles include articles discussing issues of general interest to the health education community.
- Research Articles Trend Articles present new ideas as well as
 studies or descriptions of programs
 in the early stages of development.







Medical Education Online (MEO)

MEO publishes four general categories of peer reviewed articles:

- Short Communications describe new interesting findings, working practices or techniques and are limited to 3000 words (incl. references, excl. tables/figures).
- Letters to the Editor MEO will also consider publishing letters to the editor which are reviewed by at least one managing editor but not sent out for external peer review.







Medical Education Online (MEO)

Tips:

- Be mindful of your research topic.
 Some methods (e.g., PBL) may not be characterized as new and innovative.
- A paper and the findings should contribute to the literature.
- Papers that lean on data beyond students evaluations of the learning experience tend to be more helpful to the reader.
- Follow submission directions carefully.
 - Take your time with revisions.
